


## **Castle Wood Academy SEND Hub Consultation Summary Report**

The consultation process went live on Monday 20<sup>th</sup> January 2025 until Monday 10<sup>th</sup> February 2025. In total there were 7 responses as follows:



There were 6 comments/ queries which are addressed below:

The Local Authority will agree and name the mainstream school through the SEND Code of Practice consultation process, with the designation of a Mainstream SEND Hub named in the pupils' EHC plan, if deemed the most appropriate type of setting. This is a good solution to help manage the current national SEND crisis. I'm pleased to see that 3 existing pupils will be able to access this as the host school and that it will be fully funded and therefore not impact existing school budgets.	Castle Wood Academy are working closely with Lincolnshire County Council who are fully funding this provision to alleviate the shortage of special school places. The school will have the ability to have up to 3 places available to utilise at our discretion, for all or part of the school day.

Does the proposal allow the school to support children who need the extra	The SEND hub, whilst providing SEND provision will be fully integrated into Castle Wood Academy. The vision is that the acquisition of the SEND Hub will allow for Inclusion to be at the heart of the school. All staff, including those not directly in the Hub, will benefit from training on provision, curriculum, teaching and learning to specifically support the needs of the children. We envisage this will impact all children.
support but cannot get a ehc? Or unable send refferals for diagnosis off but recognise that the child needs help?	Not all diagnosed children need an EHCP. Where the school sees it appropriate to gather information for an EHCP, they will work alongside the parents to complete this process, however, ultimately the Local Authority make a decision as to whether a child is issue an EHCP. Parents are able to request an EHCP independently.
	The school will continue to support children with SEND in line with the Code of Practice. The addition of the Hub will not change this.
